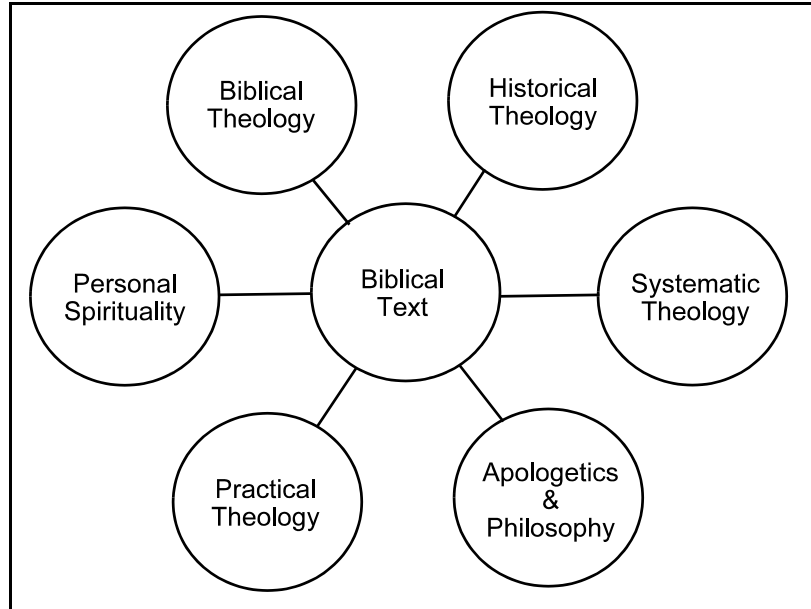

**OUR DISTINCTIVES**

- Teaching the whole Bible to the whole student. We teach the entire Bible -- that is why we call it a "Bible College." Classes are offered on a level that can go chapter by chapter through the Bible. This places the text of the Bible at the very center of our curriculum.



Instead of having a lot of separate classes on Biblically related topics, we seek to approach all of these from a study of the various books of the Bible.

- Spiritual health -- we seek to train, not only the mind, but also the soul of the student. This can only be done through interaction with spiritual leaders both in and out of the classroom setting.
- Sacrificial Service -- we believe all Christians need to receive ministry and, at the same time, to minister to others. Our program mandates that all students be actively involved in a ministry that allows them to take that which they are learning in the classroom and to apply it in the lives of others.
- Godly families -- the family today is in a state of spiritual crisis and our goal for our students is that they experience and are able to pass on a legacy of wholesome family life.
- World Vision -- Christ has called us to go out into all the world and to make disciples of the nations. This involves sharing the gospel both around the corner and around the world.

## WHAT WE BELIEVE

- The Bible is God's inspired word, complete and without error. The original manuscripts of the Old and New Testaments were inspired word for word to their fullest extent. The Bible is to be known and obeyed. It is God's sufficient revelation for His Church.
- All of life is to be lived in the presence of God. We do not divide the world into "sacred" and "secular." All of life is sacred and is to be lived unto God with reverence to His will. There is no area of human life with which Christ and His Word are not concerned.
- There is only one God and He exists in three eternal persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. These three are one God, equal in power and glory.
- All people are separated from God because they transgress His laws and none of us can make ourselves acceptable to God by trying our best to live a good life. Being good or being religious cannot take away our sin.
- Jesus Christ, the unique God-man, was conceived by the Holy Spirit in the womb of the virgin Mary and was born from her, yet without sin. He was tempted in all points as we are, yet lived a sinless life. On the cross He took the penalty of sin upon Himself. Through His death, burial and resurrection, He provided forgiveness of sin and eternal life.
- Salvation is given to people as God's free gift. We enter into that gift through repentance and faith and are declared righteous by God on the basis of the perfect righteousness of Jesus Christ which is credited to our account by faith alone.
- Though we are not saved on the basis of our own works, the Christian is one who has been saved for the purpose of doing good works. One of the evidences of true faith in Christ is in the changed life of the one who has believed the gospel.
- We are committed to the free offer of the Gospel as Jesus has commissioned His people with making disciples of all the nations.
- We await the promised return of our Lord Jesus Christ and the bodily resurrection and final judgment of all mankind.

## OUR PHILOSOPHY

We at Redeemer Bible College believe the Bible to be our only infallible rule of faith and practice. Therefore the study of the Bible is at the heart and core of our curriculum and every student majors in this study of the Bible.

## AUTHORIZATION

Redeemer Bible College is in compliance with Section 1005.(6)(f), Florida Statutes, and is therefore not under the jurisdiction or purview of the Commission for Independent Education and is not required to obtain licensure. The degree programs for Redeemer Bible College are designed solely for religious purposes.

## DENOMINATIONAL AFFILIATION

The elders of First Church West serve as the board of directors of Redeemer Bible College. First Church West is a congregation of the Presbyterian Church in America. However, Redeemer Bible College seeks to minister to students from a wide variety of evangelical denominational backgrounds.

## OBJECTIVES FOR OUR GRADUATES

Redeemer Bible College holds high expectations of its graduates.

- Graduates shall evidence a love for the Lord and for his people through involvement in a local church and participation in Christian ministry.

- Graduates shall reflect the attitude of a faithful servant to Christ through responsible, supporting and edifying interaction with their fellow students.

## STUDENT LIFE

*And whatever you do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks through Him to God the Father. (Colossians 3:17).*

The Lord has given mankind the ultimate “owner’s manual” for life. The Bible gives us the principles by which we are to live, ranging from how we approach our Lord to whom we are to marry and even how we are to get along with others.

1. Attendance in Chapel. Chapel is a strategic aspect of the development of our student community and serves to provide opportunities for worship, for spiritual inspiration and for the building up of our

college community. Attendance in chapel is required for all full-time students unless permission is given to be absent.

2. Student Government. The purpose of student government is to allow students to take an active role in the advancement of the educational, spiritual and community life of the student body. An election will be held in the spring of each year for the student body officers whose terms will begin in the fall.
3. Mentor Program. Each student will be assigned a mentor to whom he/she will issue a written monthly report detailing the student’s ministry assignments, struggles, prayer requests and praises. Students will meet with their mentors at least once a semester. Students may request a specific mentor and such requests will be taken under advisement.
4. All students are required to be a functioning part of a local church. Additionally, each student is to be involved in a ministry that allows opportunities for on-the-job ministry assignments. This ministry will be approved by the student’s mentor.
5. Students are encouraged to set aside daily time with the Lord in Bible reading, prayer and spiritual reflection.
6. When involved in media entertainment, students should remember that the Christian is called to a life of holiness. The watching and listening of various forms of media should reflect this type of lifestyle. *Finally, brethren, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is of good repute, if there is any excellence and if anything worthy of praise, let your mind dwell on these things. (Philippians 4:8).*

2. Application Fee: US applicants - \$30.00 (one-time, non-refundable), International applicants \$60 (one-time, non-refundable)
3. Auditing fee: There will be an auditing fee of \$100 per class. Auditing students may attend the class sessions without having to purchase the textbook or take any of the tests.
4. Textbooks: Students will be responsible for obtaining their own textbooks. Since this will vary from class to class, it is not possible to estimate the cost for textbooks.
5. Refund Policy: In the event a student decides to withdraw from a class, Redeemer Bible College will refund or credit the student with a portion of the student tuition and fees in accordance with the following schedule:

1st week	-	100%
2nd week	-	80%
3rd week	-	60%
4th week	-	40%
5th week	-	20%

After the fifth week, there will be no refund in the event of a withdrawal from a class.

6. Scholarships: Scholarships are available to students who are unable to afford the regular tuition. An application for a scholarship needs to be submitted in writing and detailing the financial situation of the student.
7. Deferred Payment Plan: Payment for tuition and fees is required at the beginning of the semester. For an additional \$40, a deferred payment plan is available for those students whose account is in good standing. Half of the bill is due at the beginning of the semester and the other half is due half

way through the semester. Students must apply with the Registrar for the Deferred Payment Plan at the beginning of each semester.

8. Based upon the provision of continual enrollment, students will be assessed the tuition of the catalog year in which they were registered.
9. Students are responsible for all tuition, charges and fees related to their college education. Tuition and fees are due by the first day of classes for which they have registered unless the student has opted for the Deferred Fee Plan.
10. Students may not register for a new semester or receive transcripts until all financial obligations from the prior semester have been met.

### **ADMISSIONS**

Redeemer Bible College is open to men and women who meet the entrance requirements. To be admitted to the A.A. or B.A. degree programs, students must have either received a high school diploma or have completed a G.E.D Certificate or have completed a home school program. Students may also engage in dual enrollment in conjunction with ongoing high school or home school studies and transfer all credits to the degree programs upon meeting the above requirements.

A student who wishes to enter one of the degree programs must submit the following:

1. A formal application form supplied by Redeemer Bible College must be completed and submitted.
2. Transcripts of high school or college credits. The student should contact his high school or college and have them sent directly to Redeemer Bible College.
3. Scores on the American College Testing Program (ACT) or the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) must be submitted by every student who has either graduated from high school, received at GED or completed home schooling within the last five years. Students who have not taken either of these tests must take either the ACT or the SAT and submit scores prior to beginning the second semester of classes at Redeemer Bible College.

### **CLASS ATTENDANCE**

Regular class attendance is required for all students. Absences and tardiness will be excused in accordance with the following guidelines:

1. Absence for a student's sickness or injury will be excused.
2. Absence for sickness or death in the immediate family where a student's presence is required will be excused.
3. Absences for school business or for ministry or church activities may be excused, but prior permission from the instructor will be required.
4. Each student will be permitted one unexcused absence per class.
5. Absences in excess of two classes, whether excused or unexcused, result in dismissal from the class. Re-entry will only be made upon approval from the instructor and administration and may include a reduced grade.
6. Three cases of tardiness will equal one unexcused absence.
7. The student is responsible for making up any work missed in class.

**ACADEMIC PROBATION**

In order to successfully graduate, students will maintain a 2.0 average on the above 4.0 scale. In order to assist students in this endeavor, those students who fall below a 2.0 average during any single semester will be placed on academic probation. If the student does not raise his grades above 2.0 for the following semester, the student will be suspended for a semester from taking full-time classes and must re-apply before returning as a full-time student.

**COURSE DESCRIPTIONS**

**BIBLE - Old Testament**

**BIB 101 Genesis 3 Hours**  
 An introductory survey of the entire book of Genesis that surveys the creation, fall, flood and tower of Babel and then relates the foundational promises given at these pivotal events to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. This course includes an introduction to Covenant Theology. No prerequisites required.

**BIB 120 Beginnings: Genesis 1-11. 3 Hours**  
 An in-depth exegetical study of the foundational chapters in Genesis 1-11. This course includes an examination of the issues of origins and evolution as they relate to Christian apologetics. No prerequisites required.

**BIB 130 Genesis 12-50 3 Hours**  
 An exegetical study of the larger section of Genesis that relates to the foundational promises to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. This course includes further readings in Covenant Theology. No prerequisites required.

**BIB 150 Exodus Thru Deuteronomy 3 Hours**  
 An exegetical study of the books of Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy. This course includes the development of a Christian ethic as well as the subject of typology within the Old Testament. No prerequisites required.

**BIB 210 Joshua - Samuel 3 Hours**  
 An exegetical study of the books of Joshua, Judges, Ruth, 1st & 2nd Samuel. No prerequisites required.

**BIB 220 Kings & Chronicles 3 Hours**  
 An exegetical study of the books of Kings and Chronicles. This course includes a study of the Davidic Covenant. No prerequisites required.

**BIB 301 Post Exilic Period 3 Hours**  
 An exegetical study of the books of Ezra, Nehemiah and Esther. Attention will be given to the subjects of organizational skills and organizational influence. No prerequisites required.

**BIB 320 Poets & Prophets 3 Hours**  
 A survey of the Poetical and Prophetical Books of the Old Testament. This course is designed for those students who, because of their course

schedule, are not able to take the extended exegetical studies in the various Poetical and Prophetical books of the Old Testament. No prerequisites required.

**BIB 410 Poetical Books 1 3 Hours**  
 An exegetical study of the books of Job and Psalms. This course includes the topics of theodicy and of worship in the church. No prerequisites required.

**BIB 420 Poetical Books 2 3 Hours**  
 An exegetical study of the books of Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, & Song of Solomon. This course includes an introduction to counseling. No prerequisites required.

**BIB 460 Major Prophets I 3 Hours**  
 An exegetical study of the books of Isaiah, Jeremiah and Lamentations that takes in the topic of the Messianic prophecies of the Bible and God's covenantal relationship with His people. No prerequisites required, but it is recommended that the student has already taken BIB210 and BIB220.

**BIB 470 Major Prophets II 3 Hours**  
 An exegetical study of the books of Ezekiel and Daniel. No prerequisites required, but it is recommended that the student has already taken BIB 210 and BIB 220.

**BIB 480 Minor Prophets 3 Hours**  
 An exegetical study of the books of Hosea, Joel, Amos, Obadiah, Jonah, Micah, Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Haggai, Zechariah and Malachi. Attention will be given to the subject of social reform and the ethical impact of the church upon the world. No prerequisites required.

**BIBLE - New Testament**

**BIB 140 Synoptic Gospels 3 Hours**  
 An exegetical study of the books of Matthew, Mark and Luke. Special attention will be given to the development of a philosophy of ministry based upon the discipleship methods of Jesus. No prerequisites required.

**BIB 160 Gospel of John 3 Hours**  
 An exegetical study of the Gospel of John with a special emphasis upon the person of Christ as the Son of God and developing a philosophy of evangelism. No prerequisites required.

**BIB 180 Acts** 3 Hours  
An exegetical study of the book of Acts and how it relates to the mission of the church. Students shall conduct practical exercises related to church growth. No prerequisites required.

**BIB 250 Romans** 3 Hours  
An exegetical study of the Epistle to the Romans. This class serves as an introduction to the question of soteriology as it relates to the righteousness of God. No prerequisites required.

**BIB 260 Corinthians** 3 Hours  
An exegetical study of the First and Second Epistle to the Corinthians. Emphasis will be placed on solving the practical problems of the church in a spirit of unity. No prerequisites required.

**BIB 270 Galatians & James** 3 Hours  
An exegetical study of the Epistle to the Galatians and the Epistle of James. This class examines the balance of faith and works in the Christian life. No prerequisites required.

**BIB 280 Prison Epistles** 3 Hours  
An exegetical study of the Epistles to the Ephesians, Colossians, Philippians and to Philemon focusing upon the body of Christ and its relation to its Head, Jesus Christ and the joy and freedom we have in Him. This class will include practical work in Greek Exegesis. LAN 101 is a prerequisite to this class unless special permission is received from the professor.

**BIB 380 Thessalonian Epistles** 3 Hours  
An exegetical study of the First and Second Epistles to the Thessalonians. This class also offers an introduction to New Testament Eschatology. This class will include practical work in Greek Exegesis. LAN 101 is a prerequisite to this class unless special permission is received from the professor.

**BIB 390 Pastoral Epistles** 3 Hours  
An exegetical study of the Epistles to Timothy and Titus, focusing upon practical pastoral ministries within the church. This class will include practical work in Greek Exegesis. LAN 101 is a prerequisite to this class unless special permission is received from the professor.

**BIB 430 Hebrews** 3 Hours  
An exegetical study of the Epistle to the Hebrews and the relevance of the Old Testament to the New Testament. No prerequisites required, but it

is recommended that the student has already taken BIB110, BIB120 and BIB130.

**BIB 440 General Epistles** 3 Hours  
An exegetical study of the Epistles of Peter, John and Jude and the message they bring to the living of the Christian life. This class will include practical work in Greek Exegesis. LAN 101 is a prerequisite to this class unless special permission is received from the professor.

**BIB 490 Revelation** 3 Hours  
An exegetical study of the book of Revelation and its impact upon the Christian's world and life view. No prerequisites required, but it is recommended that the student has already taken BIB110, BIB120 and BIB130.

### **SPIRITUAL & FAMILY HEALTH**

**FCE 101 Spiritual Life Seminar 1** 1 Hour  
Sacred Self: A study of the spiritual life and the development of personal spiritual disciplines. No prerequisites required.

**FCE 102 Spiritual Life Seminar 2** 1 Hour  
Sacred Marriage: A study of marriage as a means of sanctification as it makes us more like Jesus Christ. No prerequisites required.

**FCE 103 Spiritual Life Seminar 3** 1 Hour  
Sacred Family: A study of the development of family life skills including such issues as anger management, the healing of childhood wounds and the development of family communication skills. No prerequisites required.

**FCE 104 Spiritual Life Seminar 4** 1 Hour  
Sacred Family: A continuing study of the development of family life skills including such issues as anger management, the healing of childhood wounds and the development of family communication skills. No prerequisites required.

**FCE 105 Spiritual Life Seminar 5** 1 Hour  
Sacred Parenting: A study of the dynamics of raising godly children. No prerequisites required.

**FCE 106 Spiritual Life Seminar 6** 1 Hour  
Sacred Communion: A study of the building of relationships between ourselves and God as well as between ourselves and others.

**FCE 107 Spiritual Life Seminar Elective** 1 Hour  
Sacred Sex: A study of romantic love within the

bonds of marriage. Prerequisites FCE 101, FCE 102, FCE 103 required.

FCE 108 Spiritual Life Seminar Elective 1 Hour  
 Sacred Shelter: A Shelter in the Storm. This class explores the need of finding a calm amidst the troubles of life. Prerequisites FCE 101, FCE 102, FCE 103 required.

FCE 109 Spiritual Life Seminar Elective 1 Hour  
 Sacred Freedom: This class explores steps in gaining freedom from hurtful addictions. Prerequisites FCE 101, FCE 102, FCE 103 required.

FCE 110 Spiritual Life Seminar Elective 1 Hour  
 Sacred Overcoming: Overcoming your Painful Past. This class explores steps in putting past hurts behind you and moving on with a life that is free in Christ. Prerequisites FCE 101, FCE 102, FCE 103 required.

FCE 111 Spiritual Life Seminar Elective 1 Hour  
 Sacred Habits: This class explores the seven habits of highly successful people.

**HISTORY**

HIS 101 How We Got Our Bible Seminar 1 Hour  
 A study of the process of revelation, inspiration, canonicity, textual transmission and translation that was involved in bringing our Bible to us. No prerequisites required.

HIS 201 Civilizations and Culture I 3 Hours  
 A study of the history and culture from man's earliest origins to the fall of the Roman Empire in 472 A.D. This course will include insights as to how the Bible relates to the history of the world in which it is set, but attention will also be given to cultures that are outside of the scope of the Biblical narrative.

HIS 202 Civilizations and Culture II 3 Hours  
 A study of the Western Civilization from the birth of Christianity to the Reformation. This will include both a history of the early and medieval church as well as the growth of secular thought and culture. The early history of the Muslim world will also be considered.

HIS 203 Civilizations and Culture III 3 Hours  
 A study of the Western Civilization from the Reformation to the present. This will include both the history of the church as well as the movements

of modern history, culture and secular thought.

HIS 301 Biblical Archaeology 3 Hours  
 This elective traces the role of archaeology and its impact on our understanding of the Bible. The prerequisite for this course is HIS 201.

HIS 401 Travel Study Tour - Israel 3 Hours  
 This travel study tour takes the student to the land of Israel to have a first hand examination of the historical, geographical and archaeological backgrounds of the Bible.

HIS 402 Travel Study Tour - Egypt 3 Hours  
 This travel study tour takes the student to the land of Egypt to have a first hand examination of the historical, geographical and archaeological backgrounds of Egypt with a special emphasis upon their impact of our understanding of the Bible.

HIS 403 Travel Study Tour - Greece & Turkey 3 Hours  
 This travel study tour takes the student to Greece and Turkey to retrace the travels of the Apostles Paul and John through Greece and western Turkey. The student will have a first hand examination of the historical, geographical and archaeological backgrounds of these countries with a special emphasis upon their impact of our understanding of the New Testament.

**LANGUAGES**

LAN 101 Greek I 3 Hours  
 An introduction to the Koine Greek used during the days of the New Testament. The student will learn Greek grammatical forms, syntax, and vocabularies necessary for reading the New Testament in the original language. The class will include ongoing translation of various New Testament passages. No prerequisites required.

LAN 102 3 Greek II 3 Hours  
 Further studies in the Koine Greek and an introduction to the principles of Greek Exegesis. Students will also become familiar with the use of the BibleWorks Software. Prerequisite is LAN 101.

LAN 201 Hebrew I 3 Hours  
 An introduction to the Hebrew of the Old Testament. Students will learn basic vocabulary and syntax in order to facilitate their Old Testament studies. No prerequisites required.

LAN 201 Hebrew II 3 Hours

Further studies in the Hebrew of the Old Testament. Students will also become familiar with the use of the BibleWorks Software as it relates to Old Testament studies. No prerequisites required.

**ENGLISH, LITERATURE AND COMMUNICATION**

ENG 101 English Composition 3 Hours  
Basic elements of college level composition including essay structure, ways of organizing information and use of sources. The class will also include an introduction to logic and rhetoric. Students will develop research skills and critical thinking skills.

LIT 101 Great Books 3 Hours  
A study of some of the great books of the world. This class serves as a companion to Civilizations and Culture and the readings are designed to serve as insights to the various cultures they represent.

SPE 101 Fundamentals of Speech 3 Hours  
Introduction to the art of speaking in public. Students be taught basic principles of preparing and delivering speeches in both a small group setting as well as for a platform presentation. They shall also gain practical experience in various sorts of public speaking.

**THEOLOGY**

THE 101 Survey of Bible Doctrine 3 Hours  
An introductory survey of the major doctrines of the Bible including theology, anthropology, soteriology, ecclesiology and eschatology. No prerequisites required.

THE 102 Bible Study Methods 3 Hours  
A hands-on class that directs the student in learning to study and understand and apply the Bible to his own life. Students will also learn the use of regular and electronic concordances and their value in determining Greek and Hebrew translations. No prerequisites required.

THE 103 Introduction to Evangelism 3 Hours  
A hands-on introduction to the topic of evangelism, designed to equip the student so that he will be able to share his faith with others. This class will also cover the Christian's response to the various cults and world religions.

THE 104 Origins & Intelligent Design 3 Hours  
A treatment of the philosophical and apologetical issues surrounding the first eleven chapters of Genesis. This class includes an examination of the views of evolution and creationism as well as the historical and geological ramifications of Noah's Flood.

**MATHEMATICS**

MAT 101 Business Math 3 Hours  
An introduction to business mathematics. This class will also include a study of the principles of stewardship.

MAT 201 Educational Statistics 3 Hours  
Study of basic statistical concepts, both descriptive and inferential. Emphasis is placed on the use of these concepts in solving educational problems as students use statistical software to generate measurements and to provide interpretations within the context of research situations.

**CHRISTIAN EDUCATION**

EDU 301 Foundations of Education 3 Hours  
A philosophical study of our "cornerstone" and His effect upon education and the teaching profession. On His foundation, students will be introduced to pedagogical factors of cultural, social, economic, psychological and historical influence. Students will be introduced, from the basis of a Christian world view, to topics in education which include multi cultural education, inclusion, exceptionalities, and classroom discipline. Students will develop a personal Christian philosophy of education.

EDU 320 Methodology of Teaching 3 Hours  
This course introduces the student to basic methods and techniques of instruction, focusing upon the importance of purposeful teaching to specific learning objectives.

EDU 330 Teaching Math 3 Hours  
A teaching methodology course for elementary and middle school mathematics. This course includes strategies for teaching higher order thinking skills, practical applications, and assessment. Students are introduced to subject standards and the systematic order of concept acquisition. A practicum is required.

EDU 401 Teaching Reading 3 Hours  
A teaching methodology course for reading instruction and assessment. This course includes

a variety of strategies in the teaching of reading including phonics, reading comprehension and vocabulary. Students are trained in the use of various reading assessments. A practicum is required.

**EDU 410 Teaching Science & Social Studies** 3 Hours  
A teaching methodology course for elementary and middle school science and social studies. This course includes integration across the curriculum, hands-on modeling and experimentation, and information literacy. Students are introduced to the application of media and technology in the classroom.

**EDU 420 Teaching Language Arts** 3 Hours  
A teaching methodology course for elementary and middle school language arts. Students are introduced to a variety of methods and techniques for the instruction and integration of reading, writing, listening, and speaking. The writing component covers various modes of the written word, the writing process, and handwriting. A practicum is required.

**EDU 430 Applied Learning Theory** 3 Hours  
A survey of human growth and development from early childhood to young adult and the theoretical models of development that impact education. Students will apply theories of behavioral science and learning models to curricular development and instruction, classroom management and discipline,

and integration of a Christian world view to the nature of the learner.

**EDU 440 Fine Arts in Education** 3 Hours  
A teaching methodology course for art, music, and physical education. This course includes an introduction to art and music appreciation. The student learns the vocabulary, methods, and technique of teaching art and music. An introduction to human physiology and age-appropriate activities are included in the physical education component.

**EDU 450 Nature of the Learner** 3 Hours  
Emphasis placed on addressing the various forms of learning styles and the unique needs of visual-spatial, musical, and bodily-kinesthetic learners through the integration of music, movement, and the visual arts in the core subject matter.

### **COMPUTERS**

**CMP 201 Computer & Information Technology** 3 Hours  
This class will include such diverse applications as the use of Powerpoint and multimedia applications in teaching, networking a church office and Internet and E-mail office tools.
